Our Racial Equity Statement

What is advocacy?




Advocacy has a broad definition

- Advocacy is taking a position on an issue and sharing it with someone who can do something about it to bring about systemic, lasting change.
- Encompasses a broad range of activities to influence public policy.

Advocacy helps advance systemic change

- The changes we want to see in our communities and food system require public policy change.
- Raise public awareness of an issue, promotion of a cause.
- Scale successful program models, improve program admin.
- Create new policy or funding changes to support innovative solutions.
- Shift the traditional power dynamics in policy making process.

Advocacy strategies



Lobbying

An attempt to influence the introduction, change or vote on a piece of legislation.


- Direct Lobbying targets legislators.
- Grassroots Lobbying targets the general public with "call to action."
- 501(c)(3) public charities can engage in lobbying, but must comply with generous IRS lobbying limits.



Educating Legislators

Educate policymaker on impact of a specific policy or issue without encouraging a position.

- Leverage your expertise to educate about a social issue.
- Share program data with elected official to highlight impacts.



Public Education

Raising public attention on a social issue or potential effects of a specific policy, without encouraging a specific position.

- Conference, op-ed, social media, newsletter.
- Conduct or publish a study about a particular issue or program impact.

Community Organizing

Engaging people most impacted by an issue to identify shared problems & solutions as a way to build power.

- Creating open processes that distribute power more equally.
- Building the leadership capacity of those directly impacted by issues.

As people who care deeply about green spaces across New York City, we are in the midst of an exciting moment. Key transitions across the City government and within the Parks Department itself offer us an important opportunity to work together to strengthen communities and provide stronger support for green spaces across the city.

On behalf of community gardeners across the City, we urge you to ensure that each level of the City government understands the importance of supporting community gardens and their stewards. Community gardeners provide their neighborhoods with tangible resilience, create food access, foster life-giving connections between people and nature, strengthen community bonds, engage youth, empower seniors, and foster biodiversity and environmental resilience.

Coalitions

Individuals and groups that commit to collective action to advance a common policy goal.

- Align priorities and develop clear asks.
- Build broad political support.
- Share advocacy intel and resources, members can play different roles.



Power dynamics in advocacy

Pay attention to ways that forms of oppression and power dynamics may show up in your advocacy strategies and activities.

- Build advocacy strategies that center BIPOC voices and leadership.
- Ensure members of directly impacted communities inform policy priorities and advocacy strategies.
- Conduct storytelling with dignity and agency.
- Create inclusive and accessible advocacy strategies and materials.

Implementing advocacy strategies



Legislative advocacy

Legislative advocacy includes efforts to influence the introduction, change, or repeal of a piece of legislation.

- From influencing lawmakers' vote to helping write legislation.
- This may include lobbying or other communications with policymakers.

Testimony Submitted by Gabrielle Blavatsky, Co-Founder and Policy Director, Equity Advocates Before The New York City Council Committee on Land Use

Developing a Comprehensive Urban Agriculture Plan June 11, 2019

My name is Gabrielle Blavatsky and I am the Co-Founder and Policy Director of Equity Advocates. Thank you to Chairperson Rafael Salamanca as well as the members of the City Council Committee on Land Use for holding today's hearing. We submit this testimony and urge the City to incorporate the following elements into local law 1058 to ensure accountability and equity in the development and implementation of the plan:

- Establish a city-wide task force composed of City agencies, support organizations, and at least half of the members made up of gardeners and farmers representing a variety of types—for reviewing the development and implementation of the Plan.
- Host and promote community engagement opportunities at all stages of the task force's planning and plan development process.
- Provide funding to support the community engagement plans and development the urban agriculture plan.
- Regular updates to the plan are essential and should be required to ensure that the plan
 continues to address the needs of different urban agriculture stakeholders.

Budgetary advocacy

Budgetary advocacy includes efforts to influence how public money is spent.

- Funding for govt programs, services and operations.
- Budget cycles have built in opportunities for practitioners to share data and stories.



Legal advocacy

Legal advocacy or litigation includes efforts to advocate for your cause from within the court system.

- Typically last line of defense as way to overturn harmful law
- Requires specific expertise, legal team



Regulatory advocacy

Regulatory advocacy is efforts to influence rules that Govt agencies create after a bill has passed. Includes:

- Influence implementation, RFPs, reporting requirements.
- One-on-ones with agency leadership, public comments.



Regulatory advocacy—Wallace Center Examples

Host Listening Sessions

- Hear of a program under development (ex. Regional Food Business Centers, Local Food Purchase Assistance Program)
- Host listening sessions with folks on the ground who are impacted
- Compile feedback, vet with participants, then send to AMS

Provide TA and Share Recommendations

- Provide support to organizations applying for USDA grant funds
- Based on common challenges and gaps, share with AMS how to improve access

Regulatory advocacy—Wallace Center Learnings

- Keep it brief and very direct! Share info in 2-3 pages, bullet points
- Be thoughtful about the agency's stated goals in the programs you are trying to influence and frame your input as helping them reach those goals. Be a helper and they will come to you for help!
- Center leadership of those most impacted by the agency's decisions and create opportunities for them to tell their own stories.

Approaches to How YOU Advocate



Insider Political Strategies

- An "Insider" approach is engaging in cooperative advocacy tactics in formal policy making spaces often by those with access to power.
 - Meet decision-makers, work with legislative allies.
 - Partner with policymaker to draft or advise on bill language.
 - Participate in Govt advisory board, develop recommendations.



Outsider Political Strategies

- An "Outsider" approach is engaging in more confrontational tactics designed to create public pressure on policymakers.
 - Social media, op-eds, open letters critiquing the Govt.
 - Organize rally, walk-out or boycott.



Building Insider—Outsider Strategies

- Approach and tactics aren't predetermined, they can shift with:
 - new Administration and changing political realities
 - needs of the advocacy campaign





Capacity & proximity determines what level of advocacy to engage in

High engagement = Leading & Owning

 Develop policy platform, create & lead campaign strategy, draft legislation, meet with multiple target elected officials

Medium engagement = Contribute & Endorse

 Participate in coalition, provide testimony, support others' campaign activities, meet with single target elected officials

Low engagement = Follow & Support others

Sign a petition, letter or platform, share social media messages
